Nearly 300 gardeners ordered unique plant gardens and native shrubs, trees and vines from the Friends of the UW-Madison Arboretum in 2009.

These plant gardens and woody species are available only by ordering now through March 23, 2010.

Fourteen native shrubs, three trees, one vine and four plant mixes for prairie, savanna and rain gardens are available.

All plants are native to the area, and once established require minimal care.

No plants are dug from the wild. Species are suited for a wide variety of growing conditions –

sunny to shady, wet or dry, sandy or heavy soils.

Native Shrubs, Trees & Vines

American bittersweet (*Celastrus scandens*)

An excellent vine (3-30 ft), growing quickly in full sun but also shade tolerant. Its bright yellow fall color and orange fruit are outstanding. Grows on fences, trellises or tree trunks, but can be used as a ground cover on steep slopes. Only females bear fruit, so you need 1 male per 2-3 females.

American elderberry (*Sambucus canadensis*) NEW

Large clusters of tiny white flowers are followed in mid-summer by shiny, purple-black fruit that attracts songbirds. A great plant for shrub borders. Grows to 8 ft. and tolerates shade.

American plum (*Prunus americana*)

A fast growing tree that produces snow white blooms in April - May and edible fruit in summer. Fall color is maroon-red. It reaches heights of 15-20 ft. in sun or part shade.

American hazelnut (*Corylus americana*)

Nut-bearing, many-stemmed shrub that grows to 8 ft. Nuts are 1/2" in diameter; wildlife love them. Excellent red, yellow, and orange fall color. Prefers a sunny to lightly shaded spot.

Black chokeberry (*Aronia melanocarpa*)

Grows 3-6 ft, produces small white or pink-tinged flowers that develop into glossy purplish-black fruits. May be trained as a hedge. Dark green leaves turn wine-red in fall. Prefers sun/light shade.

Bur Oak (*Quercus macrocarpa*)

An adaptable tree, growing in the uplands as well as the bottomlands. Prefers heavier soils and needs full sun. One of the faster growing oaks, growing as much as 30 inches per year. Its deeply furrowed bark and massive branches create a dramatic winter landscape.

Buttonbush (*Cephalanthus occidentalis*) NEW

Glossy green leaves appear in May, followed by round clusters of unusual, Sputnik-like white flowers in July and August. Tolerates light shade and requires rich to moist soil. Reaches 6-8 ft.

Dwarf bush-honeysuckle (*Diervilla lonicera*)

Hardy, adaptable and tolerates variety of soils; prefers light shade. Spreads by underground stems. Makes nice mass plantings because of its short height and quick growth rate. Yellow, bell-shaped flowers attract butterflies, bumblebees and hummingbirds. Arching stems reach 2-3 ft.

Highbush cranberry (*Viburnum trilobum*)

Tolerates a variety of conditions and may reach 8-12 ft. Bears white flowers in May that develop into scarlet-red berries. Provides excellent food for songbirds. Wonderful fall color. Does well in full sun to light shade.

Hop-hornbeam (*Ostrya virginiana*) NEW

Also known as Ironwood, it is an excellent understory tree, reaching 20-30 ft., with yellow fall color and leaves that persist through winter adding sound and subtle color to the winter landscape. Greenish-yellow catkins appear in mid to late April. The fruit, covered with scales resembling little paper bags (or "hops"), are favorite food of cardinals and grosbeaks. Tolerant of shade and average to dry soils.

Nannyberry (*Viburnum lentago*)

Produces clusters of white flowers in May that change to berries for winter bird food. Purple-red fall color. Tolerates a variety of light and moisture conditions. Reaches 20 ft.

New Jersey tea (*Ceanothus americanus*)

Shrub of prairies and open savannas. Puffs of white color in July are spectacular, especially in masses. Its white flowers attract a diversity of insects. Reaches 2 1/2 ft with a width of 2-3 ft. Tolerant of light shade.

Ninebark (*Physocarpus opulifolius*)

An extremely hardy, 8-10 ft shrub that produces pink to white blooms in June, in umbel-like clusters. The peeling bark exposes a cinnamon brown inner bark that creates a lovely winter landscape. Great in shrub borders.

Pagoda Dogwood (*Cornus alternifolia*)

This dogwood displays beautiful horizontal branching and white flowers in the spring. Birds love the blue-black fruit in August and the fall brings maroon-red color. Grows well in shade or a few hours of morning sun. A fast growing shrub that reaches 15' in height and 10-15' in width.

Red Osier Dogwood (*Cornus stolonifera*)

Produces white flowers in May to June with white fruit and maroon leaves in the fall. This plant's uniqueness is its beautiful red stems that make a spectacular winter scene. This shrub prefers full sun and moist soil. It grows 6-8' in height.

Shagbark hickory (*Carya ovata*)

One of the best tasting nuts – if you can beat the squirrels to it. It does well in half-day of dappled shade to full sun. A slow-growing tree initially, and the shaggy bark appears after 15-20 years. Does well on mesic to dry soil; yellow fall color.

Witch hazel (*Hamamelis virginiana*)

Fragrant yellow flowers appear in fall along with golden yellow foliage. Blooms usually continue after the leaves fall. Grows in shady sites in woods, but also grows well in sun. Reaches 10-15 ft.

Winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*)

Often called our native holly, it does not have evergreen leaves, but the red berry show is spectacular in the fall. Male and female shrubs are necessary for fruit production. Winterberry requires good garden soil with adequate moisture and full sun; 9-12 ft.

Native Savanna and Prairie Plant Mixes

Arboretum Savanna Garden mix (A)

- Popular natives for areas with some shade
- 38 plants

Bergamot, Bottlebrush grass, Culver's root, Elm-leaved goldenrod, Harebell, Jacob's ladder, Ox eye sunflower, Shooting star, Sky-blue aster, Wild columbine, Wild blue phlox.

These species will bring color in areas with 2-6 hours of sunlight per day: Wild columbine, Shooting star and Jacob's ladder in the spring, Ox eye sunflower and Bergamot in mid-summer, Elm-leaved goldenrod and Sky-blue aster in the fall.

Arboretum Prairie Garden – short grasses/forbs (B)

- Keeping it short with beautiful native grasses
- 38 plants

Bicknell sedge, Harebell, Junegrass, Little blue-stem, Prairie dropseed, Prairie smoke, Purple prairie clover, Rough blazingstar, Shooting star, Side oats grama grass, Spiderwort.

This mix features four short grasses that will thrive and seed themselves in sunny areas and forbs to provide color accents throughout the season. A constant show of color will amaze visitors to your garden—from Prairie smoke and Shooting stars in the spring, to Purple prairie clover and Harbell in mid-season to golden grasses in the fall.

Butterfly and Hummingbird Prairie Mix (C)

- Create a habitat for butterflies, birds and native pollinators
- 38 plants

Bergamot, Black-eyed Susan, Butterflyweed, Joe Pye weed, New England aster, Pale purple coneflower, Prairie blazingstar, Purple prairie clover, Red milkweed, Showy goldenrod, Wild columbine.

The butterflies, hummingbirds, songbirds and pollinators will thank you for your efforts in planting this mix. These native plants may attract three times as many pollinators as non-native species.

Rain Garden Mix (D)

- Reduce rainwater runoff and pollution
- 32 plants

Bergamot, Cardinal flower, Culver's root, Fox sedge, Mountain mint, New England aster, Prairie blazingstar, Prairie smoke, Stiff goldenrod, Sweet black-eyed Susan, Wild iris.

A rain garden is a shallow depression planted with plants tolerant of alternating periods of rain and drought. This native rain garden mix will increase the amount of water filtering into the ground by 30 percent while enhancing the beauty of your yard and neighborhood.

Plant spacing should be approximately one square foot per plant.
